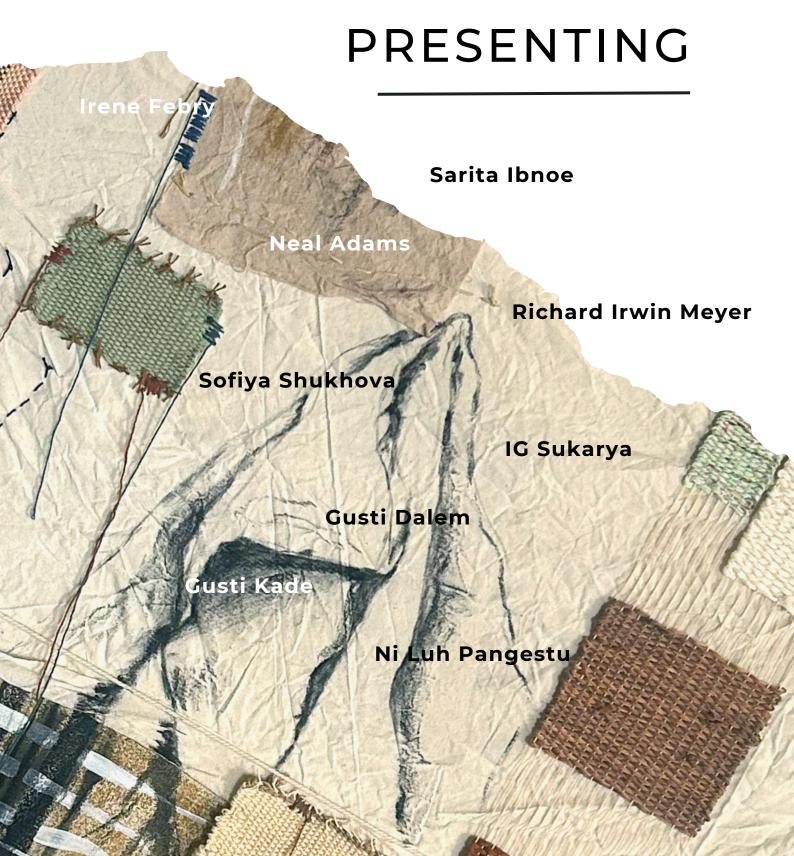

The program encourages risk-taking, interdisciplinary dialogue, and the development of site-specific or research-based projects, culminating in showcases, exhibitions, and collaborations.

#### PREFACE

This exhibition is a contemporary response to Bali's layered identity—ritualistic, ecological, spiritual, and highly sensorial. "Rites of Return" refers to the cyclical nature of time and tradition in Bali, and how contemporary artists engage with myth, landscape, and sacred materials through personal visual languages. Set within the immersive atmosphere in Bali, the exhibition draws from the island's essence: the tactile, the symbolic, the ephemeral. Here, materials carry memory, and making is a sacred gesture. The exhibition aims to present a strong sensory feeling—a constellation of works where abstraction, craft, and mythos co-exist.

#### IRENE FEBRY

B. 1989, Bogor

Irene Febry is an Indonesian mixed-media artist currently based in Bali. She earned her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from LASALLE College of the Arts, Singapore. Irene's practice explores the intersections of color, form, and materiality, often inspired by the organic patterns and textures found in nature —ranging from sand, stone, and fungi to microorganisms and insects.

Her works often incorporate recycled materials and found objects, granting them a renewed presence and meaning through artistic transformation. In her recent explorations, Irene turns to grains such as rice, corn, and other natural materials as both medium and metaphor, embedding them into her surfaces as a reflection of the nation's current social and environmental conditions. In her latest series, Irene expands this dialogue between ecology and human experience. River Runs Dry speaks to both ecological crisis and personal reflection: rivers running low on water, and the self running low on inspiration. It evokes the depletion of nature and the human spirit alike.

Meanwhile, Hidup—meaning both "life" and "being alive"—emerges with layered forms and organic textures that mirror the vitality of forests, flora, and fauna. It is abundant, teeming with life, and celebrates the interconnectedness of all living things, reminding us of the importance of protecting and being protected in return.

Through her sensitivity to materials, Irene Febry creates works that resonate with urgency and hope, inviting viewers to contemplate resilience, cycles of life, and humanity's intimate bond with nature.

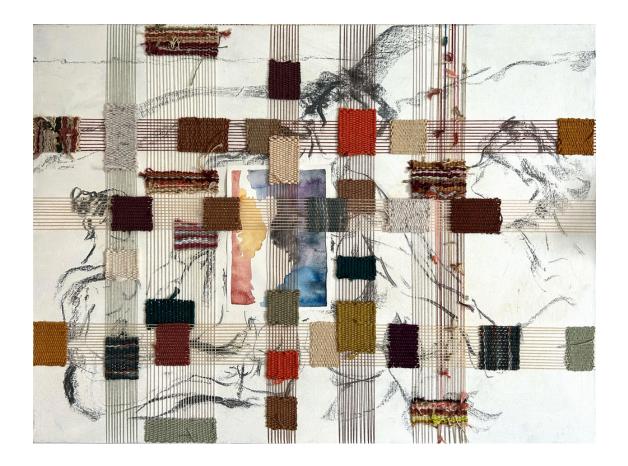

Sarita Ibnoe, raised in Jakarta and Kuala Lumpur, is a multidisciplinary artist with a traveler's soul. After completing her BA in Illustration from Middlesex University, London, she began her artistic career as a graphic designer and an illustrator and later found mixed media as well as weaving. Weaving is now her main activity as she creates wearable products as well as artworks.

Her approaches in art are focused on the rebuilding of memories, placing moments of her life under a microscopic lens as well as connecting little pieces of her life together while placing the lives of others in line with hers. As an artist who is constantly trying to connect the dots, Sarita found the joy of being in journeys and being in between places.

This current series began with a spirit of exploration. It brings together polar opposites—such as dark and light, hard and soft, masculine and feminine—either blending them or allowing them to interrupt one another. This concept is also reflected in the textile—making process, where a delicate material like yarn in treated in a forceful, almost masculine manner; stretched, pushed, and worked in repetition. Perhaps this is why it is called kerajinan—the Indonesian word for 'craft', which also means 'diligence' or 'careful and persistent effort'. It is an abstract exploration of how their opposing forces interact and interrupt one another within the weaving process.

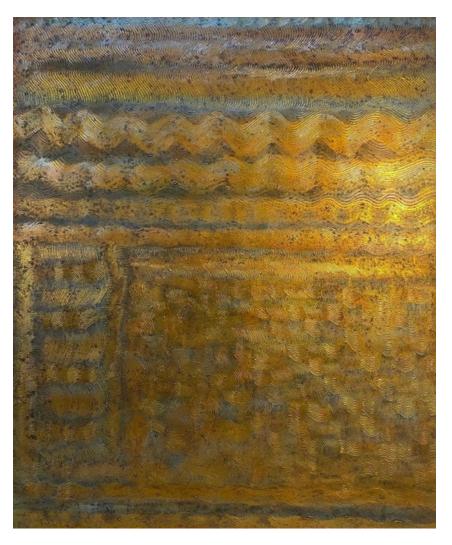
I am searching for the feeling and emotional connection, creating paintings that pay homage to the skill and dedication of so many craftswomen and men.

Richard Irwin Meyer is an American artist who is currently based in Indonesia. He was born and raised in Yakima, Washington, on the west coast of the United States in 1950. After attending the state university, he studied painting with noted American artist Gandy Brodie in Vermont and New York. He found his way to the East in 1999 during the end of the great Asian financial crisis that reached its peak a year earlier. It was a long and fascinating journey that changed his life and his point of view about the East.

His abstract compositions driven by chromatic intensity and dynamic lines. His works are like visual jazz—controlled improvisation—blending order and spontaneity.

During the COVID-19 crisis period, in the middle of the pandemic, he spent more time in his recent house and studio in Yogyakarta. He paints several paintings, catching vibes of objects and moments he recalls. Instead of presenting it in his early style that showed more blocks of colors as a layered painting with hard lines on it, he tried to develop a new technique by adding new softer layers and lines that suited his recent feeling. Peeking out his Western echoes by scraping his Eastern layers creating lines of windows in different sizes and lengths. Here are some of his recent paintings depicting a view of his West past that locked up after he found a new home in the East. He scrapes out some lines to free it, comes out and emerges with the Eastern layers. This combination creates an amazing signature of Richard Irwin Meyer.

Gallery at Marina Barrage and the State Museum of Biology in Moscow.

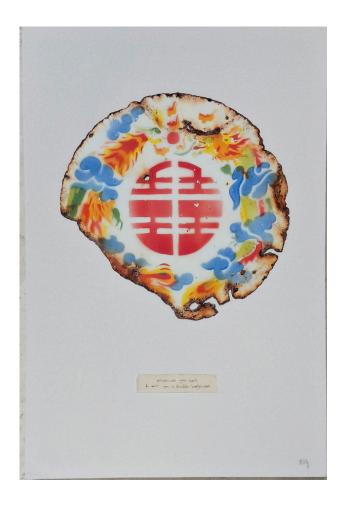

### I. G. SUKARYA

B. 1995, Bali

IG Sukarya's works are inspired by everyday life, traditional customs and culture.

In his exploratory studies, he discovered a Balinese cultural heritage called Tatah Art, an ancient art that can be found in barong, rangda and wayang clothing.

From the findings of his exploration, I.G Sukarya chose to use cowhide, as a medium that is linked to the regeneration of the development of images from carving (Tatah) art which was initially intended for direct usage/commission work to become fine art.

Inheriting the carving technique always depicts a hedonistic form full of Balinese ornaments. In the eyes of I.G Sukarya, this is a form that is simpler and closer to today's reality. So that every detail of his work provides room for imagination for the viewer to pay more attention to how his work can form imaginary illusions and experiences of the viewer.

#### GUSTI DALEM

B. 1996, Bali

Gusti Dalem is recognized for his deep sensitivity to ceramic as both material and medium. Born into a family of traditional ceramic artisans, Dalem's early exposure to clay laid the genealogical foundation for his artistic journey. In 2015, he entered the Institute of the Arts Indonesia (ISI) Denpasar to formally study ceramic craft, a decision that deepened his relationship with the material and affirmed his commitment to exploring its expressive possibilities. Gusti Dalem's practice challenges the longstanding binary between function and expression in the field of craft. His works are born from a persistent questioning of conventions within the discipline of ceramics, and his ideas attempt to navigate and often dismantle these boundaries. With a conceptual and experimental approach, Dalem positions himself within the discourse of contemporary craft, using ceramic not only as material but as cultural and philosophical inquiry. Central to his practice is a profound attention to the materiality of Balinese clay and its symbolic ties to the island's cultural worldview. For Dalem, clay is more than substance; it is a vessel of memory, place, and cosmology. His fascination lies in how the Balinese cultural landscape understands earth as a vital element of civilization and how that knowledge can be reactivated through contemporary artistic languages.

In 2022, Dalem held his first solo exhibition Kisah 8000 Kepal Tanah (The Tale of 8000 Clumps of Earth) at Uma Seminyak, Bali. The show was the culmination of his research into the properties of Balinese clay and a meditation on how traditional materials can speak to contemporary ideas. His participation in group exhibition such as Im/materiality with Puri Art gAllery in 2003, Seek Within, Puri Art Gallery X Art Jakarta Scene 2023, and the recent work was also featured in Trajectory of Perception: Chronicles of Balinese Contemporary Art at Tony Raka Gallery, Ubud in 2024, signalling his growing presence in the island's contemporary art landscape.

#### GUSTI KADE/GUSADE

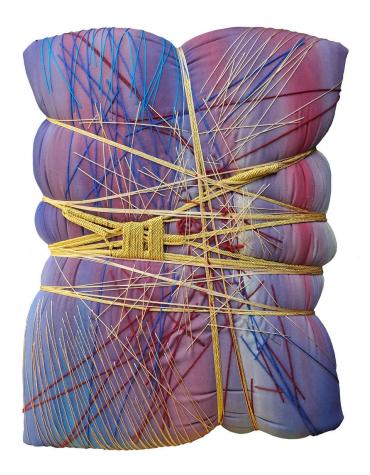
B. 2000, Bali

Gusti Kade is a contemporary Balinese artist who re-explores cultural heritage and childhood experiences through the medium of cloth. A Bachelor of Painting graduate from the Indonesian Institute of the Arts (ISI) Denpasar (2018–2022), Gusti Kade develops his artistic practice with an experimental approach to materials, particularly cloth and traditional Jembrana embroidery techniques.

Since 2022, he has been active in art collectives such as Penawar Racun and Gurat Institut, which have broadened his perspective on art and culture. His works combine dyeing, sewing, and fabric installation techniques, creating visual narratives rooted in Balinese spirituality and cultural symbolism.

Through this approach, Gusti Kade not only represents aesthetic forms but also weaves profound conceptual meanings, inviting audiences to engage in critical dialogue about identity and cultural heritage.

#### NI LUH — PANGESTU

B. 1991, Bali

Ni Luh Pangestu Widya Sari is a Balinese visual artist whose practice centers on printmaking, with a particular focus on the linocut technique. Rather than relying on color to create contrast, Pangestu is more drawn to the tactile textures produced by the carved strokes of her tools. For her, the sensory engagement with the surface—through touch—is as vital as the visual composition, offering a multisensory experience that deepens the viewer's interaction with her work. This emphasis on texture introduces a new dimension to her practice, extending beyond figurative elements and imaginative forms.

Rooted in the animistic worldview of Balinese society, where every being is believed to possess a spirit and a voice, Pangestu's works often embody a subtle, magical presence. Her visual narratives are influenced by these beliefs, resulting in compositions that feel both mystical and intimate.

Pangestu's approach to linocut is not limited to the final printed image. She frequently repurposes the carved linoleum blocks themselves as standalone sculptural objects, treating the carved surface as the final artwork. Her practice is deeply inspired by literary narratives and ancient tales, which she reimagines through surreal forms and expansive wall compositions. Her works often break away from the constraints of the traditional print format, transforming wall surfaces into immersive storytelling spaces where the boundaries between artwork and architecture dissolve.
